CHAPTER 1 Money for a friend



They went there with many servants, and they gave her lots of expensive presents.

Bassanio didn't have enough money to do this, and he felt miserable about that. For the time being, Portia had not agreed to marry anybody, but Bassanio was worried that she would soon be tired of saying 'no' and would

All that I have is in my ships at sea: one has gone to Tripoli, another to Lisbon, a third to England, a fourth to India and a fifth to Mexico. Now I'm waiting for them all to return. When they do, I'll be three times richer than I was before, and I can give you all the money that you want.'

Then he saw the sad look in Bassanio's eyes, and, feeling sorry for the young man, he said, 'Don't worry, my friend. Because you need the money now, I'll borrow it from Shylock and give it to you today. I want you to marry Portia and be happy.'

Shylock the moneylender was very rich. He lent money to people and made them pay back more than they had borrowed. He loved money more than anything — more than his family and more than his friends. But he wasn't a very popular man in Venice, and he didn't have many friends, because he was so mean. He hated spending

'When all my ships come back to Venice, I can give you your money back,' he said. 'I don't often lend money. And I never borrow money for myself. But Bassanio, my best friend, has asked me for help when I don't have any money to hand. So I'd like to borrow this sum from you now, if you agree.'

At first Shylock wasn't very happy with the plan. 'What will happen if all your ships cross dangerous waters and sink in storms at sea before they return to Venice? You won't have the money to pay me.'

Then he had an idea and smiled. 'Look. Let's be friends,' he said to Antonio. 'I'll be glad to lend you this money for free. You're a kind and generous man, and I want to show you that I can be as kind and generous as you are. But for a joke, I've got an idea, and maybe you can agree to it. There Antonio signed a bond that said Shylock would lend him 3000 gold coins for three months, and that he would give Shylock a pound of his flesh if he couldn't pay him back on time. After that was done, Shylock put the gold coins into Antonio's hands.

CHAPTER 2 The guessing game


Antonio and Bassanio left the moneylender's office with the 3000 gold coins. Out in the street, Antonio gave the money to his best friend.

'I'll be good and quiet, I'll say "thank you" and "sorry", and I'll only speak when I'm spoken to,' said Gratiano.

'All right,' smiled Bassanio. 'Then you can come.'

Portia's father had wanted his daughter to marry a good man. So, before he died, he had invented a plan to help her to find the best husband of all. He asked the cleverest craftsman in Venice to make three beautiful metal boxes for him: a gold box, a silver box and a lead box.


'It's time to play the game,' she said.



'Not now. But wait a minute,' Jessica called down to him. She didn't want the neighbours listening to them.


She left the window and went straight to her room. There she wrote Lorenzo a short note.





'Welcome home, husband,' said Portia to Bassanio at the door.






